

9,300 cartoons for 9,300 children

Help us send 9,300 postcards of kindness to children asylum seekers in the UK



- Every year, thousands of children under 14 arrive in the UK without parents or guardians searching for a safe home.
- As part of the <u>Cartoons Not Cruelty</u> campaign, we're sending postcards with messages of kindness to child asylum seekers arriving in the UK. The designs were created by the British public in response to the Government removing children's cartoon murals in asylum centres citing that they are "not age-appropriate".
- To say that the cartoons are "not age appropriate" fails to recognise the 9,300 under-14s that arrived in the UK just last year. And fails to recognise how in that moment where a child may be feeling frightened or confused, even a small token of comfort could make a difference. That is why we will send 9,300 postcards. A postcard to represent each of those children. To say that we see you. And that you deserve better.
- We will continue campaigning to bring the cartoons back. But in the meantime, through this postcard campaign, we will take this into our own hands to make sure no child is deprived of a warm welcome.
- This action is inspired by children at City of Sanctuary, UK schools who
 drew and sent cartoons in response to the cartoons being removed. The
 Refugee Council are supporting us by distributing the postcards, so they
 can bring hope to where it is needed most.
